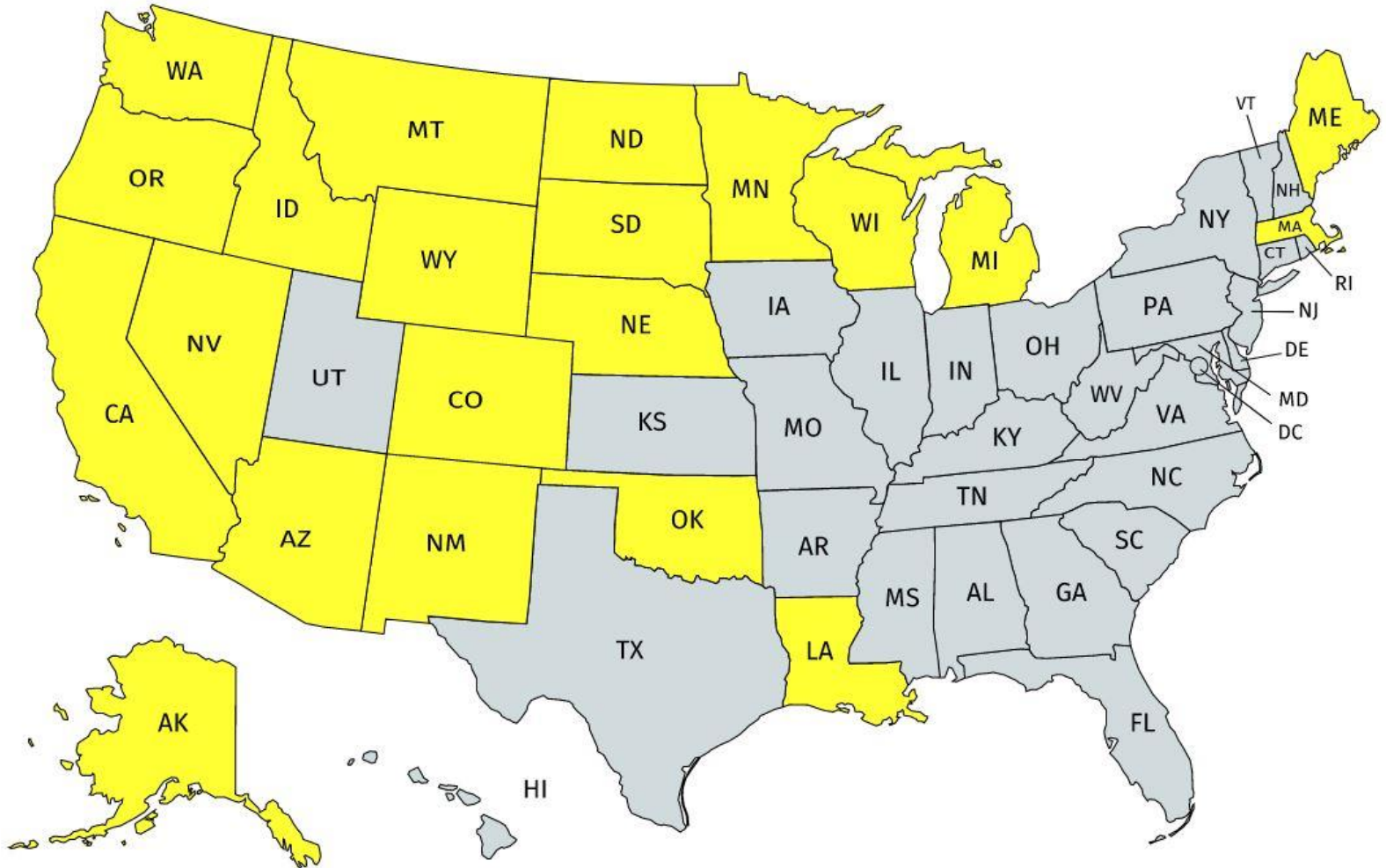

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## Introduction

Rural tribal communities are particularly vulnerable to COVID-19 due to geographic barriers and inherent health care infrastructure and workforce inequities. The Rural Tribal COVID-19 Response (RTCR) program is a Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) initiative focused on addressing the novel coronavirus disease (COVID-19). The purpose is to provide maximum flexibility to assist tribes, tribal organizations, urban Indian health organizations, and health service providers to tribes to prevent, prepare for, and respond to the coronavirus and the evolving needs in rural communities. Specifically, this program will provide funding to assist tribes to engage in activities that may include, but are not limited to:

- ❖ establishing testing sites, purchasing test kits,
- ❖ implementing telehealth strategies/activities,
- ❖ purchasing personal protective equipment (PPE) and other supplies,
- ❖ and hiring and/or training health care providers and other health care personnel to provide care for COVID-19 patients.

In developing this funding opportunity, the Federal Office of Rural Health Policy (FORHP) consulted with tribal leaders, State Offices of Rural Health with strong relationships to local tribes, and tribes that were already FORHP grantees through several conference calls between the end of March and mid-April, to better understand the needs of tribal communities related to COVID-19.

This directory provides contact information and a brief project description of the 57 Tribal entities funded under the Rural Tribal COVID-19 Response Grant Program in the 2020-2022 funding cycle.

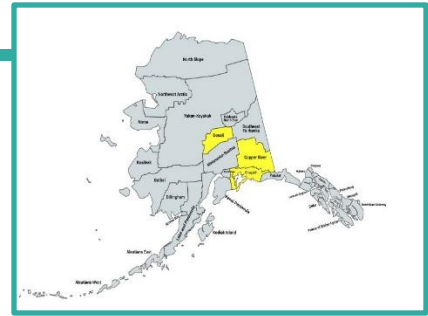

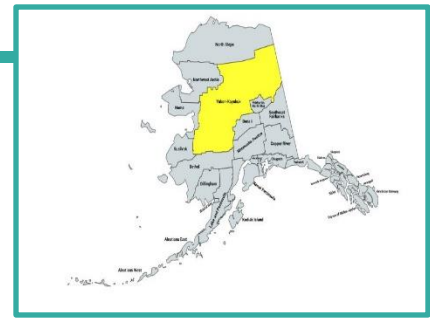

<b>Project Description:</b>				
<p>Copper River Native Association (CRNA) serves the Copper River Basin - an area of more than 20,000 square miles located approximately 200 miles northeast of Anchorage. CRNA is the first line of defense in preventing, preparing for, and responding to COVID-19. CRNA is utilizing an incident command structure to undertake planning and response coordination. The incident command system has established critical operating procedures to protect employees and patients.</p> <p>An outdoor drive-through screening and testing site is in place and allows our dedicated testing team to offer exceptional COVID-19 related care. A Cepheid molecular system supports the provision of COVID-19 testing for all Copper Basin Alaska Natives. Abbott ID analyzers have also been purchased and currently under construction is a dedicated testing facility. Funding from this grant has also been used to purchase critical COVID-19 response supplies and personal protective equipment (PPE). The Elder Services department has begun delivery of over 100 meals a day to the vulnerable elder population, which allows them to remain in the safety of their own homes.</p> <p>Additionally, CRNA is developing a Virtual Electronic Record (ER) system in a recently installed trauma bay, which will help local providers stabilize patients under the guidance of the virtual ER doctor until the patient can be transported to a facility possessing a higher level of care. Due to the low volume of patients needing respiratory support at our facility, providers do not practice intubation regularly. This program may also support local patient care if Anchorage becomes overwhelmed by COVID-19.</p> <p>Despite best efforts, CRNA continues to have unmet needs and gaps that must be filled to prevent, prepare for, and respond to COVID-19. There have been several significant outbreaks during this pandemic. The urgent need for resources cannot be overstated. Plans to continue strengthening the local response include:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Continuing the Incident Command System (ICS) to plan and execute CRNA's pandemic response. An ICS allows CRNA to respond to emergencies with maximum effectiveness and broader coordination with governmental organizations.</li> </ol>				

2. Purchasing essential equipment, including ICS communications radios, telecommunications equipment for a virtual ER, permanent refrigeration, a Cepheid rapid testing machine, and medical/laboratory equipment, as needed.
3. Providing PPE for staff, providers, first responders, and the tribal community, including procuring viral cleaning supplies and COVID-19 testing supplies. Additionally, purchasing food containers to move our elders' lunch program from gathering inside CRNA to home deliveries to abide by social distancing requirements.

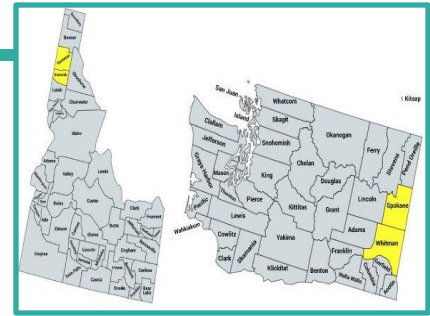

<p>The Alaska Native Tribal Health Consortium (ANTHC) is situated in the south-central city of Anchorage. It is America's largest and most comprehensive Native-owned health services organization, serving over 175,000 Alaska Native people statewide and representing 229 federally recognized tribes. Of this service population, this project focuses on the American Indians/Alaska Natives beneficiaries residing in the Yukon-Kuskokwim region in western Alaska. Spanning approximately 75,000 square miles, it is accessible only by water or air and is about 400 miles from the urban city of Anchorage. There are 58 rural villages scattered throughout the 75,000 miles, and the population sizes range from 25 to over 1,000 in these communities. Bethel, Alaska, is considered the hub city in this region and where the Yuut Elintraurviat Dental Training Clinic (YEDTC) is located, which is the base for this project. The Indian Health Service (IHS) data shows a critical need for dental care. This project supports the Alaska Dental Therapy Educational Program, enabling it to safely provide educational training and dental treatment to patients in the Yukon-Kuskokwim Delta. This project provides funding for infection control supplies, personal protective equipment, COVID-19 testing supplies, and financially supporting the program's infection control coordinator (salary, continuing education, and certification training).</p>

<p>The Bear River Band of the Rohnerville's project will support their response efforts as they prepare for the next wave of COVID-19 cases. The tribe has purchased personal protective equipment (PPE) and supplies for their continued COVID-19 response efforts for their tribal community and staff. The Bear River Band also hired a consultant to develop a detailed COVID-19 response plan, including an Emergency Operations Assistant to work on the day-to-day activities outlined in the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) grant work plan. They will also be providing onsite training for the Incident Command System (ICS) 300 and 400 for their Tribal Council.</p>

<p>The purpose of this project is to enhance and implement telehealth strategies and activities. The focus is to increase services to Coeur d'Alene Tribal members and other federally recognized tribes in the service area during the COVID-19 crisis. In response to the COVID-19 pandemic health restrictions, an evaluation of the Information Technology (IT) capacity to provide telehealth indicated a dire need to increase the telehealth capacity. The project plan is to (1) replace the outdated switch infrastructure at the medical clinic; (2) replace dated batteries for data center backup; (3) upgrade the uninterruptible power supply for backup at the Wellness Center; (4) increase needed storage area network; (5) upgrade wireless connections; and (6) increase the number of laptops and webcams. The Marimn Information Technology Department plans to implement these activities. The team will request bids, place purchase orders, and install equipment and supplies for each of the described needs as preparation to meet the demands of the COVID-19 crisis.</p>

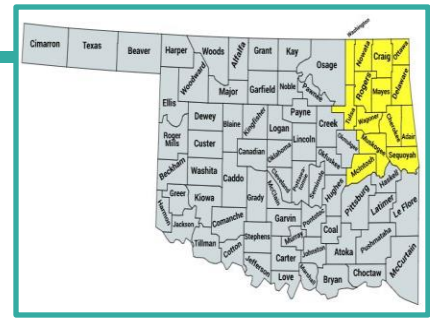

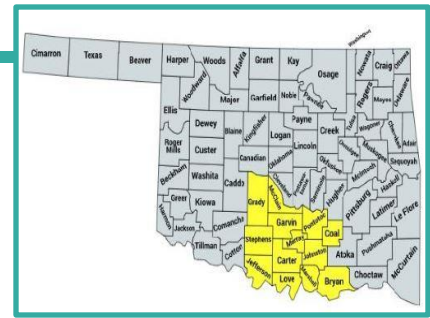

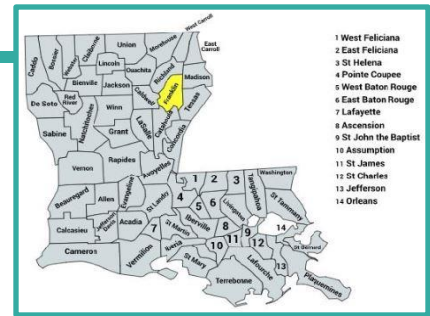

### Project Description:

On May 1, 2020, the Chitimacha Tribe of Louisiana Health Clinic saw a drastic uptick in the number of tribal members that needed COVID-19 testing. The tribe was concerned that, due to the number of people exposed, the number of positive cases of COVID-19 would increase and that the tribe would not have the necessary tests and supplies to meet the need. The clinic was fortunate that the Nashville Area Indian Health Services provided the Health Clinic with an Abbott Analyzer, strips for testing, and some supplies with the understanding that the supplies would be given for six weeks. The clinic was concerned that by June 2020, they would no longer be receiving tests for their tribal community, thus placing their community at greater risk of spreading COVID-19.

The Chitimacha Tribe of Louisiana would have many unbudgeted needs as this COVID-19 pandemic continues to impact the tribal community. Without financial assistance to purchase tests and other COVID-19 related supplies, tribal members may not get the care that they need. The nearest test site is ten miles away, located in Franklin, Louisiana. It has operated very infrequently. During the week of May 5, 2020, the Franklin site announced that they only had 50 tests available, not nearly enough for the general population without the addition of tribal members. Since the clinic is in a rural area, there is no public transportation available. The Health Clinic has some capabilities but is short staffed at this time. In turn, this makes it difficult for some tribal members to access healthcare services off of the Chitimacha Reservation.

The Chitimacha Tribe of Louisiana would use these critical grant funds to purchase supplies to help prevent the spread of COVID-19, to prepare for additional testing, and to respond to the needs of those patients who test positive and/or quarantined. To adequately handle the health crisis, personal protective equipment (PPE) for health clinic staff (physician, clinic nurse, dentist, hygienist, dental assistant, social workers, fire protection and law enforcement, if needed), tests, disinfectant, additional staff, and supplies for patients who are required to quarantine are being requested. The tribe has also been provided with the Abbott Analyzer. However, the test strips are expensive, costing \$60 per test on the open market. Increased testing will strain the clinic's supplies of PPE as well as cleaning supplies. Two lab technicians would be hired to assist the Clinic's General Practitioner and Clinic Nurse, as needed when large groups require testing to increase staff capabilities. The Human Services staff would provide one bag per household of

essential items needed for the 14-day quarantine. The tribe is also interested in providing masks for the community and antibody testing once a test is approved.

To purchase telehealth equipment such as laptops, webcams, digital cameras, a digital network, workstations and associated telehealth training for the added behavioral health services. At-home monitoring equipment such as scales, thermometers and blood pressure machines will be purchased for tribal members' home use during regular telehealth visits with the Tribal Health Clinic. To establish a functional COVID-19 testing site that maintains staff and patient safety along with meeting the needs of the tribal community. Colusa County and the Tribal Health Clinic have struggled to offer testing to tribal patients due to lack of testing sites in the rural area along with a shortage of Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) and testing kits. The COVID-19 testing site will be located on the reservation in a parking lot outside the Tribal Health Clinic. This will eliminate the risk of patients and staff being exposed to potential COVID-19 patients.</p>

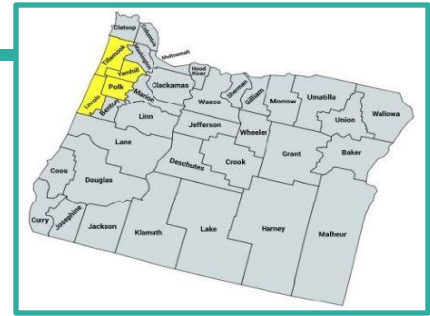

<p>The Confederated Tribes of the Colville Reservation (CTCR) occupies 2,100 square miles with about 8,000 individuals, of whom about 4,000 are Native American. Tribal lands are geographically remote and include mountain ranges and deep valleys, making communication difficult, particularly during the winter months when roads can become impassable. The CTCR compacted with the Indian Health Service for delivery of behavioral health services in 1984. Health service delivery has been complicated by the Reservation's history as a confederation of 12 distinct tribes with distinct cultures and languages. Services have been divided among different entities, including CTCR's Health and Human Services and two Indian Health Service-compacted primary clinics. Each clinic operates under a different administration and has a distinct electronic medical record system. Specialty and hospital services are offered off-reservation in Grand Coulee and Omak. With this grant, CTCR is: (1) developing a comprehensive plan of evidence-based mental health and/or substance use disorder treatment services for individuals impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic; (2) screening and assessing clients for the presence of mental health and substance use disorders and/or co-occurring disorders and develop appropriate treatment approaches; (3) providing evidence-based and population appropriate treatment services; (4) providing recovery support services to improve access to, and retention in, services; (5) developing crisis mental health services, including 24-hour mobile crisis teams, emergency crisis intervention services including psychiatric/medical assessment and where indicated, medication administration, and crisis stabilization; (6) utilizing third-party reimbursements and other revenue realized from the provision of services and facilitate the health insurance application and enrollment process for eligible uninsured clients.</p>

Tribal elders' health care issues include COVID-19 risk factors of obesity, diabetes, heart disease, and respiratory illness. The community also has many members with similar health conditions, who are also at an increased risk for contracting a severe illness from COVID-19.</p> <p>The Confederated Tribes of Grand Ronde Community Health department provides home visits to community elders and other at-risk Native American community members who require assistance with basic health care needs, light housekeeping needs, nutrition and medication support, and non-emergent medical transportation. Due to social distancing related to COVID-19, many tribal elders and residents are isolated at home without consistent human interaction, cannot easily accomplish daily living activities without assistance, and/or unable to easily access food, medications, or healthcare. The two Community Health Representatives support the additional needs of tribal members in the local community directly related to COVID-19. Specifically, by increasing home visiting resulting from recommended social isolation and in response to any identified positive COVID-19 cases.</p>

<p>The Cow Creek Band of Umpqua Tribe of Indians (CCBUTI) is developing a robust COVID-19 response for their service area by leveraging technology services. The public health asset management system enables accurate burn-rates projections, correct asset lifecycle knowledge, and provides real-time inventory accounts. CCBUTI's incident command team and public health department have allocated resources from this project to utilize the EZOfficeInventory cloud application for assets management of emergency health supplies and personal protective equipment (PPE), from procurement through their disposal. The application has pre-established alert notification when supplies reach low and critical levels to redirect procurement management efforts to essential clinic supply needs. In addition, CCBUTI has put an Automated Contact Tracing System in place, which ensures all positive COVID-19 tests are under surveillance by the Tribal public health department. Contact tracing represents a core function to reduce the risk of transmission. The team has also developed a robust system for contacting and supporting community members. Utilization of the Qualtrics XM surveying and analysis system helps to automate this process and reduces the burden on the clinic and public health staff. The system allows community members to give daily feedback to analyze their comments to understand the measurable impact on transmission. This system also allows for data sharing between tribal clinics. Additional response work includes delivering PPE inventory pods throughout the service territory to bolster the pandemic response now and prepare for future emergency response needs. The CCBUTI has improved testing capacity, adapted a parking lot triage for winter testing, and supported aggressive contact tracing and services with the help of a case manager to ensure that all patients are followed closely and that tribal members receive wrap-around services. Further, CCBUTI has improved access to care for community elders by coordinating transportation services, developing a testing strategy through the Human Services department, and has improved staff safety with qualitative fit testing.</p>

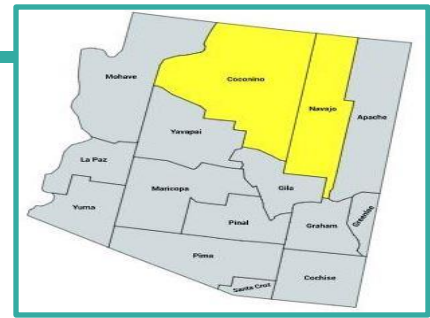

<p>The Inter-tribal Council of Michigan (ITC of MI) is federally recognized as a tribal organization located in Sault Ste. Marie, Chippewa County, Michigan, which is a rural area. ITC of MI is a 501(c) (3) non-profit corporation, which acts as a coalition of all 12 federally recognized tribes in Michigan and is governed by a Board of Directors comprising the elected tribal chairpersons of all 12 tribes in the state. The COVID-19 response project proposed in this application seeks to provide centralized support to the eight most northern tribal communities, a total of 45 counties, including all the Upper Peninsula and the northern third of the Lower Peninsula. All 45 counties in the service area meet the Health Resources and Services Administration's rural health grant eligibility criteria. The 45 rural northern counties included in the target area for this project have an estimated population of over 25,000 persons.</p> <p>Among the general population of the proposed rural tribal service area, as of May 5, 2020, over 800 cases of COVID-19 have been reported. The number of COVID-19 cases among tribal members or residents of tribal reservation lands has not been compiled. Cases are also not currently being tracked due to a lack of protocol and agreements which would support the collaborative data sharing needed between tribes and local/county health departments. The state of Michigan has published data on the overall percentage of cases in the state, including reports among people of the American Indian race but has not released specific numbers. This, along with provider shortages, inadequate health care resources, and a vulnerable population, presents significant challenges to the tribes' ability to prepare for, respond to, and eventually recover from the COVID-19 pandemic.</p>				

A two-year project is proposed to provide tangible resources, training, technical assistance, and coordination to build capacity. The service relationship that ITC of MI has built with Michigan tribes over the past 50 years, and public health expertise within current and a proposed new staff position, will be leveraged to address unmet needs in six areas critical to effective COVID-19 response including: 1) Increasing the ability to maintain support services via telehealth for people managing chronic disease; 2) Outreach to the fragile and elderly to provide support during all phases from preparedness through recovery; 3) Expand access to personal protective equipment (PPE) for health care and essential worker personnel, and testing supplies and equipment, including medical tents to stage isolated outdoors testing locations, to ensure continuation of normal clinical operations as well as administer COVID-19 testing; 4) Development and implementation of clear protocols for sharing testing, case and contact tracing tasks and data between tribal and county health authorities; 5) Training for tribal staff on the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's guidelines for community worksites, and health care facilities; and 6) Assurance of consistent and frequent analysis and monitoring of local and regional rural tribal case data.

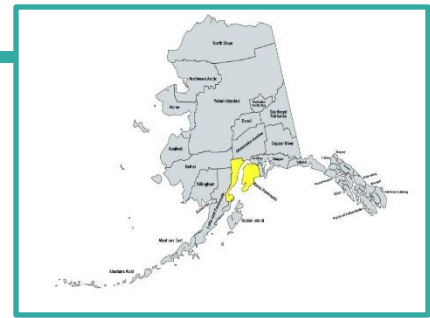

### Project Description:

In anticipation of a possible surge in COVID-19-positive cases, the Kenaitze Indian Tribe (Kenaitze) and Dena'ina Wellness Center (DWC) have applied grant resources to improve preparedness and response efforts. The DWC has purchased equipped to admit un'ina (Dena'ina word meaning "those who come to us") patients and to support overnight care. As one of the only two major health facilities throughout the service area, the DWC determined this capacity development was essential to safely treat un'ina who may need significant care, including overnight admittance.

Most Alaska Native/American Indian un'ina reside in significantly rural areas, with few options for public or commercial transportation. The region is served by the Central Area Rural Transit Service (CARTS), funded by the Federal Transit Administration (FTA), and Alaska Cab, the only conventional carrier. Kenaitze does offer transit services via its Tribal Transportation Department operating as a demand-response (scheduled) provider but does not currently provide emergency (no notice) transportation to the DWC for urgent care. Emergency 911 calls will trigger an ambulance service that routes patients to CPH. If CPH is already at maximum service capacity, additional resources are available through this project to support emergency transport of COVID-19-positive or COVID-19-suspected cases so that un'ina can make it to the DWC timely and safely.

A concerning aspect of the COVID-19 pandemic is that the virus is highly contagious via droplets and possibly airborne. To reduce the risk of transmission, the DWC has addressed air circulation deficiencies by applying project resources to recommission the heating, ventilation, and air conditioning (HVAC) system. Additional enhancements necessary to mitigate the airborne spread of COVID-19 throughout the facility via these ventilation systems have also been incorporated. Further, the DWC has expanded the negative-pressure environments at the DWC to serve a higher number of un'ina in the facility and reduce the risk of transmission.

COVID-19 infection also tends to produce a drop in blood-oxygen levels without presenting other symptoms, leading to a very rapid decline in the individual's vital status. To prioritize clinic space for more severe cases, additional tools have been purchased to enable Primary Care staff to monitor milder symptoms of un'ina diagnosed with or suspected of

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COVID-19 from their homes and facilitate communication among providers. This approach limits contact with providers and other un'ina at the DWC while also enabling continued off-site monitoring of each individual's condition.

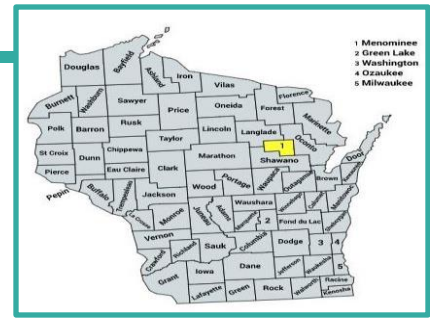

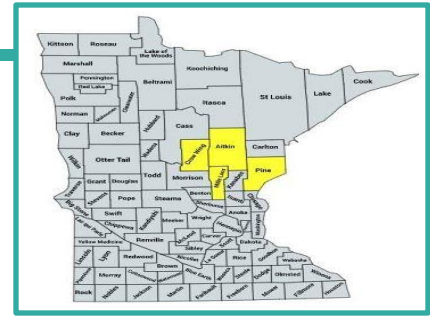

<p>This grant will support the purchase of personal protective equipment (PPE), safety supplies, and testing. One gap the community faces is the limited PPE available to the clinical staff and essential workers. Essential workers such as clinical staff, law enforcement officers, victim advocates, conservation officers, detention officers, Maehnowesekiyah Wellness Center staff, aging, and community-based residential facility staff need PPE, including gowns, masks, and gloves. Additionally, they need storage carts designated explicitly for the safe collection of used PPEs, the safe distribution of new PPE, and the safe distribution of medication for residential facilities residents. The community's essential workers are working in a community with high prevention and intervention needs in medical services, mental health services, criminality, suicidality, and substance abuse and overdoses. Unfortunately, these issues are on the rise during the COVID-19 pandemic. Additional needs for essential workers include Community Safety Supply kits consisting of soaps, sanitizers, cleaning, and laundry supplies; personal care supplies for distribution to community members; sanitation supplies for deep cleaning of facilities (mistifiers, UV lights, cleaning solutions); metal storage cabinets used for the storage of supplies and kits; partitions to separate office workspace to ensure appropriate social distancing within shared workspaces; and plexiglass sneeze guards in reception areas to prevent exposure and safe social distancing in common waiting spaces. Increased COVID-19 testing is also needed at the Menominee Tribal Clinic. The facility has a limited amount of testing supplies. The tribe believes increased testing will result in surveillance and monitoring of the presence of COVID-19 in the community and will help contain the spread of the virus. There is also a sound process that was developed by the Incident Command team for surveillance and monitoring. However, some community members are tested in the nearby off-reservation town of Shawano as they go to the emergency room with symptoms. If the clinic had increased testing capabilities, more tribal members who are experiencing symptoms would be tested.</p>

<p>The Mentasta Traditional Council is a Native Alaska community in Mentasta, Alaska. As part of the Alaska Native Claims Settles Act of 1971, the Mentasta village merged with Ahtna, Inc., although it remains an independent, federally recognized tribe. Mentasta is the northernmost Ahtna community, home to the “headwaters people” who have been stewards of the Upper Copper River lands for centuries. Today, Mentasta Lake is a vibrant community of 106 villagers known for Native rights activism and a K-12 campus named in the most well-known resident’s honor. Approximately 21% of the Mentasta community is 55 years old or older, placing the community at a disproportionate risk of adverse COVID-19 effects. Mentasta has a great residential density and a strong, interlinked community. However, access to resources and amenities found in other communities is limited. Currently, the community relies on a local Nurse Practitioner commuting to town once a week. The nearest available medical attention is over 50 miles away – 1 hour by car. Further, there are currently no ambulatory vehicles or emergency medical personnel to assist with transport. Villagers must find their own way to the medical center in Tok, Alaska, if the ailment demands immediate attention.</p> <p>This grant has allowed the Mentasta Traditional Council to purchase an emergency transport vehicle and hire a security patrol officer to ensure the village maintains closed during the COVID-19 outbreak. The Mentasta Traditional Council has purchased supplies like personal protective equipment (PPE), sanitizer, COVID-19 tests, and implemented telehealth services. Additionally, the grant has allowed the Mentasta Traditional Council to repair the local recreation center's water system, which may serve as a quarantine facility.</p>

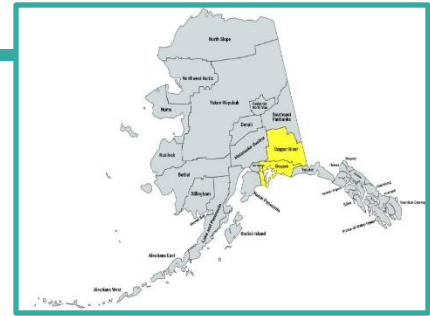

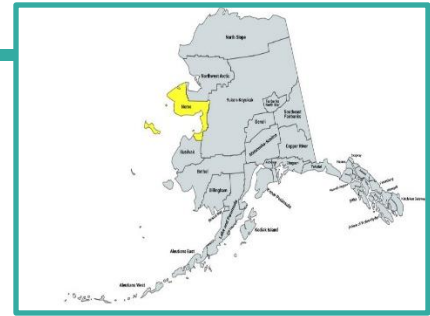
The Northern Arapaho Tribe is a federally recognized tribe residing on the Wind River Indian Reservation in south central Wyoming. The Northern Arapaho Tribe Wind River Family and Community Health Care System (WRFCHCS) was established in 2016 under the Indian Self-Determination and Education Act (PL-93-628), as the provider of comprehensive health care services to the Northern Arapaho tribal members and American Indians on the Wind River Indian Reservation. The WRFCHCS is also the Designated Public Health Authority (PHA) for the Northern Arapaho. Wyoming has a population of 577,737 persons and is classified as a “frontier” state with less than six persons per square miles in 17 of its 23 counties. The Wind River Indian Reservation (WRIR) is located mainly within Fremont County (population 39,803) and is even more ‘frontier’ with only 4.4 persons per square miles on its 2.2-million-acre reservation and encompassed lands. The City of Riverton lies within its exterior boundaries with a population of 11,058 persons. The Health Resource and Services Administration (HRSA) reports that the Wind River Service Area (the Wind River Indian Reservation’s Indian Health Services area) is a Medically Underserved Area (MUA), a High Needs Geographic Health Professional Shortage Area (HPSA) for mental health services, and a Low-Income Professional Shortage area for dental health and primary care for all areas served by the WRFCHCS. . The Health Resource and Services Administration (HRSA) reports that the Wind River Service Area (the Wind River Indian Reservation’s Indian Health Services area) is a Medically Underserved Area, a High Needs Geographic Health Professional Shortage Area for Mental Health services, and a Low-Income Professional Shortage area for Dental Health and Primary Care for all areas served by the WRFCHCS.

The WRFCHCS dental department had 2,870 new patient visits and 4,556 established patient visits for a total of 7,426 patient visits, of which 1,277 were children. The clinic processes over 1,200 emergency visits annually. To reduce the risk of contagion, the team has purchased equipment, enabling them to utilize lasers instead of traditional drills. Laser dental cavity preparation creates little, if any, aerosol emission. The Dental Department has installed one of the two lasers purchased in the existing dental mobile clinic unit to minimize contagion related to emergency and urgent COVID-19 patient care by limiting entry into the main clinical spaces. It also allows for dental service provision throughout the rural reservation, minimizing travel by patients to crowded clinical settings. The second unit is dedicated to pediatric cases at the 12th Street Clinic, reducing contagion to the school-age population. Minimizing travel by patients to the

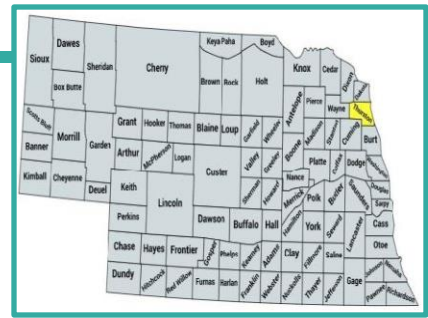

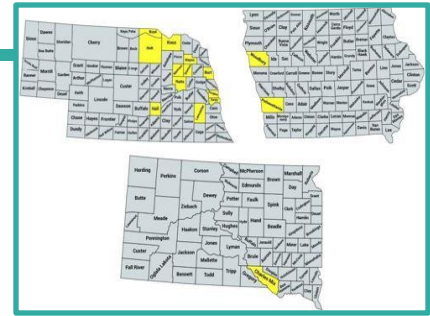

<p>Norton Sound Health Corporation (NSHC) serves 16 communities in the Bering Strait Region, a 22,000 square mile area in northwest Alaska that extends to the Bering Sea's Russian border. The service area of NSHC includes 16 small communities that are only accessible by air. The community's population ranges from 102 to 758 persons. Each community has a community health center to serve local primary care needs. Higher levels of care are provided via telemedicine, by traveling to larger clinics in Unalakleet or Nome, or being transported for emergency care to Nome or Anchorage hospitals. Due to extreme wintertime weather and the lack of road service in the communities, in extreme medical scenarios, members must be airlifted to the nearest facility with adequate infrastructure. Many of the patients at NSHC retain a subsistence lifestyle (85%). Regionally, community members experience higher poverty and uninsured rates than the state collectively. Nearly 1/3 of the 10,000 residents in the region live without running water or sewer. This project provides supplies to treat water to support increased hygiene practices during the pandemic. Basins, pump sinks, sanitizer, and household cleaning products are dispersed in communities with incomplete or partial plumbing. Additionally, care packages with food, buckets for water storage, and personal protective equipment (PPE) have been sent. Other work encompasses the provision of quarantine space and PPE materials for staff.</p>

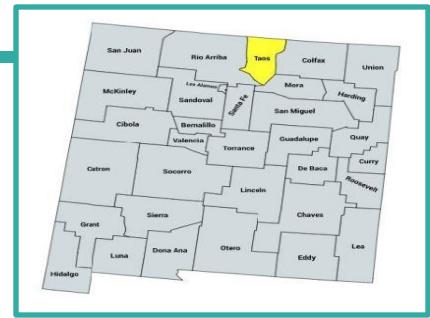
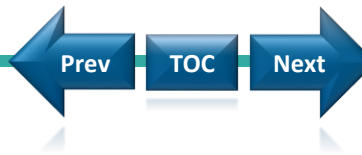

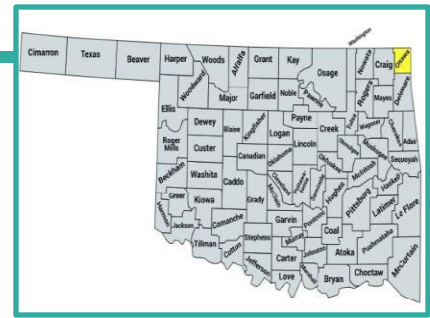

### Project Description:

The Santee Sioux Nation has 4,060 enrolled members. Of those, approximately 1,100 live on the Santee Sioux reservation or in the surrounding area. Approximately 600 adults and 500 children live on the reservation. The Nation is headquartered in Santee, Nebraska, in Knox County in the northeast part of the state. The reservation covers 204 square miles, all of which is rural.

About 65% of Santee Sioux Nation members are female, and about 35% are male. About 15% are young adults (ages 18-24), about 80% are adults (ages 25-64), and about 6% are age 65 or older. Further, about 17% of Santee Sioux Nation members have less than a high school education, and 12% completed college. Adults in the Santee Sioux Nation community suffer from diabetes, obesity, cardiovascular disease, depression, substance abuse, cancer, and tobacco use. Of the 915 patients served by the Santee Health and Wellness Center in 2017-2018, 44.9% or 411 adults were classified as obese. About 21% or 193 were diagnosed with diabetes. Cardiovascular disease rates are also high, at 54%. Additionally, data from the Santee Health and Wellness Center indicates that about 60% of patients are current tobacco users (compared to 16% for all Nebraska residents), representing another significant risk factor for COVID-19.

#### Plans to Respond to the Needs of the Population:

According to the Rural Health Grants Eligibility Analyzer, the entirety of the Santee Sioux Nation's reservation is located in a rural area of Nebraska.

For patients who do not have access to the internet or Wi-Fi at home, SEARHC Technology Associates deliver the software-enabled tablets to the patient for their scheduled telehealth visit.</p> <p>The introduction of new telehealth equipment and systems enables the team to consult with the Mayo Clinic telemedicine staff on improving operations and telemedicine delivery. The team also applied project funding to support system performance and improvement tracking using the DataRobot Automated Machine Learning. This allows for SEARHC to evaluate and improve its telehealth program over time.</p>

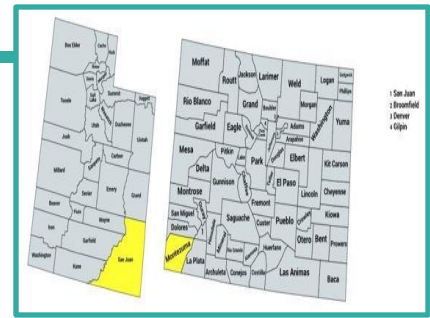

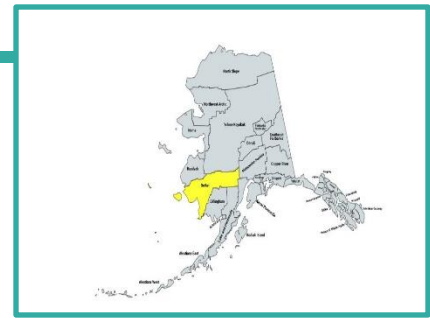

<p>The Village of Aniak is a federally recognized tribe located on the Kuskokwim River in western Alaska, 317 miles west of Anchorage. Aniak is a remote community accessible by plane year-round and boat when the Kuskokwim River is free of ice. No roads connect Aniak with any other community, but in the winter, when the Kuskokwim River freezes, the river is plowed by tribes into an ice road that can reach up to 200 miles, weather permitting. In the winter, traveling on the ice road is dangerous as there is open water, drifting snow, almost constant darkness, and extreme cold. Barges bring in supplies and fuel a few times in the summer. Aniak is surrounded by rolling hills, tundra, and boreal forest. The population of Aniak is 485 persons, of which 79% are Alaska Natives, Yup'ik Eskimo, and Tanaina Athabascan. Additionally, 36% of the population is aged 45 years or older.</p> <p>The Village of Aniak is purchasing masks, gloves, gowns, and face shields to protect health care providers when they are conducting COVID-19 testing and treating COVID-19 patients. The Aniak team has identified training resources for providers, based on availability, including training in COVID-19 testing administration. The team is also establishing a testing site at a location other than the clinic by setting up tents. The team has identified the local airfield as a possible testing location.</p> <p>The Aniak team is:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. 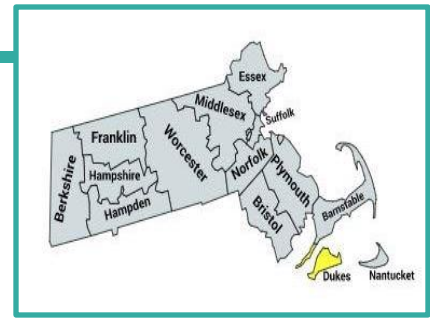

The WPH's organizational mission is to provide community-driven public health services to all Wabanaki communities while honoring its cultural knowledge, cultivating innovation, and collaboration. Furthermore, the Tribal Public Health District is unique due to the intergovernmental relationship between Maine and the federally recognized tribes as sovereign nations.</p> <p>Over the last several months, it is increasingly more evident that this pandemic is impacting nearly all the tribal communities and citizens WPH works with. Maine's tribal populations are also familiar with disparities related to education, health, economy, and employment. The COVID-19 pandemic has led to an increase in depression, anxiety, trauma, and grief. WPH anticipates an increase in substance misuse, as the lives of individuals and families are deeply impacted.</p> <p>Each of the tribal communities has an incident command structure and has been closed to help prevent the spread of COVID-19. The communities have several ongoing activities that are unique to each of their tribes' needs. Their efforts to ensure the health and safety of their tribal citizens is a complex and a challenging task. WPH collaborates with each tribe to deliver public health services. Over the past months, WPH has coordinated the distributions of food, fresh fruits, vegetables, clean drinking water, and cleaning supplies, including hand sanitizer. WPH continues to implement projects that promote safety, social distancing, and connections to traditional language and culture. <p>This project aims to increase the tribal government’s capacity to respond to and prepare for the adverse impact and unfolding social aftermath of COVID-19 for those with close social and economic ties to or living within the reservation boundaries of the Wampanoag Tribe of Gay Head (Aquinnah). Objective One: Increase the capacity of the Health Department to support the public within 90 days post-award. With most of the on-island direct care offered at the Tribal Administration building within the Wampanoag Health Service (WHS), only one registered nurse, and a visiting ad locum general practitioner, there is an urgent need to pair health needs with health resources. These activities will take the combined effort of the Health Department staff and staff of the Community Health Representative program. The achievement of this goal will include 1) providing telephone and virtual support tools for providers and the public; 2) culturally sensitive resource guides; 3) family support tools for improved mental health and medication refill plans; 4) a local rapid testing plan; and 5) a food provision plan. Objective Two: Deliver coordinated COVID-19 response to the public. Chronic underfunding of the Indian Health Services limits its ability to provide timely, quality care. Since the duration and extent of this virus are yet unknown, it is vital that the tribe becomes equipped to respond to the issues that limit the durability of care to the community. The objective will be accomplished by 1) identifying potential supply shortages and working with vendors and the health care coalition if resource availability is limited; 2) extend emergency assistance relief to the public based on revised policies; 3) deliver behavioral health and community support through educational outreach using telemedicine and similar technologies; 4) provide technology tools for public use to assist in resource searches, application and additional relief benefits not otherwise provided by the tribe (e.g., unemployment benefits, food stamps, etc.); and 5) review and update health plans as a result of COVID-19, to include virtual health and telemedicine as a staple within the tribe’s health programs.</p>
